E1. DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST.

There were no Declarations of Interest to record.

E2. MINUTES OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING HELD ON 29TH APRIL, 2013.

The minutes of the previous meeting of the Cabinet Member for Communities and Cohesion held on 29th April, 2013, were considered.

In relation to Minute No. E55 (Restorative Justice – Waiving of Standing Orders) it was requested that the Minute be amended to read that the ‘Rotherham Integrated Youth Support Service’ operated the contract for restorative justice support.

Resolved: - That with the amendment above, the minutes of the previous meeting of the Cabinet Member for Communities and Cohesion be agreed as an accurate record for signature by the Cabinet Member.

E3. SINGLE INFRASTRUCTURE GRANT - PRESENTATION.

The Cabinet Member welcomed colleagues from the Voluntary and Community Sector (VCS), Shafique Hussain, Peter Foyle and Julie Adamson. Shafique, Peter and Julie had been invited to the meeting along with the Community Engagement Manager (Neighbourhood and Adult Services) to report on the actions of the Rotherham (VCS) Infrastructure Network (RIN). In particular, an update would be provided on the Single Infrastructure Grant that the VCS RIN received including:-

- An overview of the voluntary and community sector in Rotherham was provided;
- The benefits and contributions provided by the voluntary and community sector;
- The role of the VCS Infrastructure in supporting, information, training, advice and guidance to the estimated 1,500 voluntary and community organisations in Rotherham;
- The Rotherham VCS worked collaboratively to ensure that representation of the 1,500 organisations was representative;
- Key delivery areas of the VCS Infrastructure included: volunteer co-ordination, services support, service development and voice, engagement and representation.

In the financial year 2012/13, the Rotherham Infrastructure Network had: -

Volunteering: -

- Brokered and supported 1,342 new volunteers;
- Seen an increase in the number of groups registered;
- Produced a Rotherham volunteer strategy;
- Provided volunteer training and support for pathways into work;
- Co-ordinated/contributed to support for key events and activities.

Services Support: -

- Provided comprehensive weekly email bulletins;
- Used GISMO to promote all services Borough;
- Undertook organisational training and capacity building;
- Assisted 302 groups to make 721 funding searches;
- 7 organisations had received specific tailored funding advice and guidance;
- Facilitated rural community building sessions and Yorkshire community venues website;
- Worked with Black and Minority Ethnic (BME) representative groups to target funding opportunities;
- Worked with the Disability Network;
- Direct Payments and BME families research;
- Mosque training;
- Interfaith events.

Service Development: -

- Supported the implementation of the Financial Inclusion Strategy;
- Provided/facilitated financial capability training;
- Facilitated VCS Information and Collaboration Sessions;
- Targeted initiatives for BME organisations and communities, including supporting communities to access Services and provision, and identification of and addressing market gaps.

Voice, Engagement and Representation: -

- Undertaken recruitment and selection of strategic VCS representatives on Rotherham Partnerships and Boards, including the Local Social Partnership, Safer Futures Community Network and the Health and Wellbeing Board;
- Had a VCS group membership in excess of 620 individuals;
- Contributed to the Health and Wellbeing Strategy;
- Contributed to community cohesion and awareness raising work.

Case studies where the VCS had brokered individuals into full-time, stable employment were considered. The individuals had been matched to access placements for volunteering opportunities and had come from baselines of long-term unemployment and did not have qualifications. Rotherham VCS had helped the individuals to gain employment skills and

access qualifications, which had supported them to the next step of developing contacts and pursuing opportunities.

During the 2012/13 financial year, the RIN had helped Rotherham groups to secure £4million of funding.

Discussion ensued on the production of the RIN's annual report to publicise the impacts of the organisation and demonstrate the use and impact of the Single Infrastructure Grant, and how this grant enabled the RIN to support VCS groups to contribute to the Council's Corporate Plan. The Cabinet Member asked that quantitative figures be inserted into the report to demonstrate the progress that had been achieved.

Resolved: - That the information shared be noted.

E4. ROTHERHAM'S INTEGRATED YOUTH SUPPORT SERVICE - UPDATE.

The Head of the Rotherham Integrated Youth Support Service (Schools and Lifelong Learning, Children and Young People's Services) provided an update against the project plan on the development of the Integrated Youth Support Service for Rotherham.

Further to Minute No. E54 (Update on the creation of the Rotherham Integrated Youth Support Service) of the Cabinet Member for Communities and Cohesion held on 29th April, 2013, recent progress now reported included: -

- The recruitment process to the Service's structure had been concluded and interviews to 120 posts had taken place;
- It was now envisaged that a much smaller number of posts would be made redundant from the structure;
- The soft launch of the Service would take place on the week beginning 8th July. Local relationships had been maintained as far as possible, and where changes were unavoidable, transition and support had been arranged for young people who would experience changes in their key workers;
- The official launch of the Service had been planned for the week beginning 22nd July. The official opening of the town centre base would take place during the week, and town centre events would take place to promote the re-launched Service;
- A Communications Strategy for all stakeholders had been produced, and would address the needs of each group;
- A new cohort of apprentices would join the Service in September, 2013;
- Development work had taken place on the Youth Offer website;
- All Area Teams were in place and were operating with a strong core to ensure that the needs of local areas were addressed and satisfied;

- All Area Teams would have local Plans in place by 1st September, 2013, incorporating the statutory and local requirements, and would include the role of local infrastructure and governance and all local stakeholders;
- Joint working was continuing with partners, including Public Health and Child and Adolescent Mental Health Teams (CAMHS);
- Required savings had been achieved through the restructure;
- Work was continuing on the Service's Transport Strategy.

Resolved: - (1) That the information shared be noted.

(2) That the Cabinet Member receive further updates in relation to the progress and development of the Rotherham Integrated Youth Support Service.

5. Summary

A key outcome of the Integrated Youth Support Service restructure has been the creation of the Service Specification. The Specification has been developed in partnership with the RMBC Commissioning Service. The Specification document (see Appendix 1) contains an overview of the core business of IYSS and information of how the work will be implemented operationally

The purpose of this report is to present the IYSS Service Specification to Elected Members for information and feedback.

A failure to complete and implement a robust Service Specification would impede the effective delivery of provision to young people in Rotherham.

10. Policy and Performance Agenda Implications

The Local Authority has a statutory role in implementing raising of the participation age (RPA) in terms of both ensuring a September offer of learning to all young people aged 16-18 , influencing the development of provision to meet the needs of young people in their locality providing support to young people NEET and tracking outcomes for the 16-19 cohort.

Rotherham is currently experiencing the highest youth unemployment figures for 16-25 year olds but has sustained performance with 16 -18 year olds. There is a risk that 16-18 year olds NEET may rise as a result of the pace of change.

Rotherham has a statutory responsibility to deliver work to young people in terms of the "Positive for Youth" agenda.

Rotherham has statutory responsibilities in terms of delivering Youth Offending Services to young people in Rotherham.

The Service Specification is required in order to effectively deliver the above items.

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Background and introduction

Overview

The Service Specification for the Rotherham Integrated Youth Support Service aims to contribute towards the Rotherham vision of ***“Working together to improve the lives of all Rotherham’s children and young people”*** and specifically in relation to the Children and Young People’s Services vision of delivering early help and prevention for children, young people and their families and reducing the impact of disadvantage; ***“Rotherham is a place where children, young people and families have access to what they needs to enable them to thrive”***.

This Service Specification sets out the model, service and performance standards for the Rotherham Integrated Youth Support Service, which will see the full integration of resources of the Youth Offending Service, Youth Service and the Connexions Service, which, alongside other services and stakeholders, will develop arrangements to ensure that vulnerable young people receive targeted support *through* Universal provision.

The service will be a critical delivery component in supporting the partnership to achieve positive outcomes for vulnerable young people and will be rigorously underpinned by the context of relevant statutory requirements including “Positive for Youth”, Corporate planning, the “Four big things” the Early Help Strategy and Operational Plan, the National Youth Agency Quality Standards Framework and HR and Finance processes.

All provision will be underpinned by a comprehensive Voice and Influence strategy and young people will have access to opportunities for personal and social development, Voice and influence and a broad range of interesting and challenging positive activities.

Integrated Youth Support Service Vision

The overall Vision of the Rotherham Integrated Youth Support Service will be a robust menu of provision ranging from open access to specialised support enabling young people to access what they need, when and where they need it.

This detailed and effective Youth Offer for Rotherham will join together providers from all sectors in enabling young people to access what they need, when and where they need it.

Service Outcomes

The Integrated Youth Support Service has been developed around the Early Support/IYSS outcomes Framework, with all elements of provision designed to deliver against one or more of those outcomes. The service outcomes are as follows:

- Young people are financially able
- Young people keep themselves healthy
- Young people attend school and achieve a good standard of education
- Young people are not involved in crime or at risk of exploitation
- Young people live in a safe and decent home
- Young people engage with their local community and local services
- Young People are able to stay safe

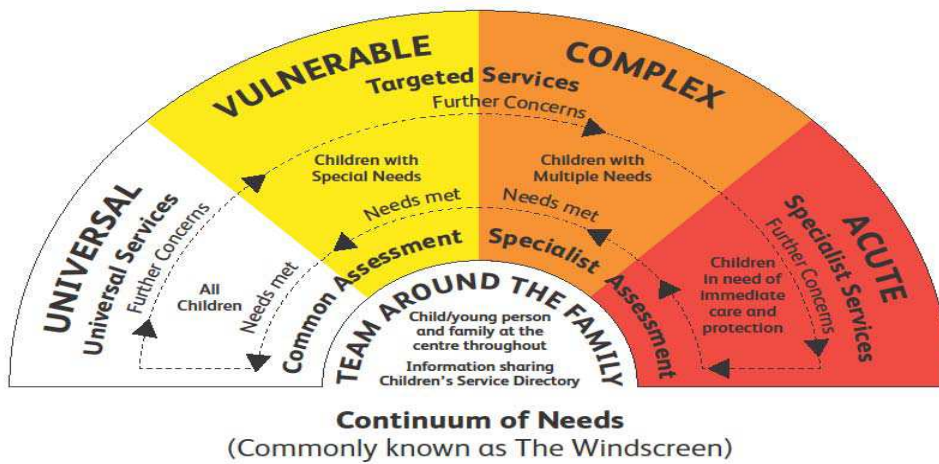
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There are specific categories of need under each of the above outcomes, which will form the basis of the IYSS work plan, and which are fully described within each of the service outcomes later on in the specification.

The Integrated Youth Support Service Outcomes support the priorities of the Rotherham Children and Young People’s Action Plan 2013-16 and as such is therefore linked into the Health and Wellbeing strategy.

Scope of Service

The component elements of the Integrated Youth Support Service range from Universal open access services, through to targeted services that aim to meet the needs of those young people who are vulnerable and those with complex needs. The IYSS Outcomes Framework is based on the Continuum of Need as outlined below:



The elements of the Integrated Youth Support Service, whilst not necessarily working solely within a particular category of need, are mapped out as follows:

Open Access/Universal
IYSS open access curriculum based youth activities
Vulnerable
IYSS Early Intervention provision
Complex
Support with restorative justice
Support young people on reprimand and on final warnings
Support for young people with substance misuse problems
Support for young people excluded from school and to re-engage
Acute
Youth offending

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All staff will be skilled in delivering a wide range of interventions up to level one or two enabling staff to deal with the young persons concern there and then. If the worker felt that more specialised support were needed then he or she would identify suitable provision and support the young person in accessing it. Most frequently the specialised support required would be found within the IYSS but if it wasn't then the worker would support the young person in accessing specialised or external services.

Service Model

The Integrated Youth Support service will be a critical delivery component in supporting the partnership to achieve positive outcomes for vulnerable young people. It will be planned and delivered as a key component of the Early Help Strategy prioritising preventative support to vulnerable young people in order to achieve the against the Early Help/Integrated Youth Support outcomes. The service priorities will be determined by the identified needs of the 15 Learning communities with an appropriate focus on achieving progress in the eleven most deprived areas. An extended remit of the service will be to contribute to our integrated family approaches such as our multi agency intervention Families for Change programme, which supports the most troubled families in Rotherham.

The Integrated Youth Support service model will operate across Rotherham and will be modelled as follows:

The Central Hub

There will be three Rotherham Town Centre locations forming the Integrated Youth Support Service Hub:

Central Support Base - Eric Manns Building

The Central Service Hub will comprise of a high quality one-stop shop provision for young people based in Rotherham Town Centre, which will be a young person centred environment. This will be the base for a broad range of provision, which will be as follows:

Youth Start – Central base

Open access support for all young people according to need; including targeted and specialist support in response to those most at risk of poor outcomes and young people presenting with complex needs. This will be through interventions including; therapeutic support, counselling, advice, information, health clinics and personal support, young people are offered a unique combination of early help and crisis support.

Youth Offending Core Team

The Youth Offending Core Team based in the Central Service Hub, will comprise of the Court Team, Case Management Team, Accommodation Officer, Drugs & Substance Misuse Officer and Re-settlement and Intensive Supervision workers. The team will operate borough wide.

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Learning & Engagement Core Team

The Learning and Engagement Core Team will comprise of Youth Support Workers, SEN Specialist Personal Advisors, Post 16 NEET Personal Advisors. The team will provide the full learning and engagement offer, including targeted Information, Advice and Guidance, and information on choices, opportunities and progression routes primarily at young people with Special Educational Needs and Post 16.

Voice and Influence Team

The Voice and Influence Team, comprising of Youth Support Workers, will support Voice and Influence across the Integrated Youth Support Service and will specifically lead on the support and development of the Youth Cabinet, LAC Council and the UK Youth Parliament MP arrangements.

Partnership and Development Team

The Partnership and Development Youth Support Workers will lead on staff development, support the development of relationships with the Voluntary Community Sector and lead on Equalities across the Integrated Youth Support Service.

The team will include a small team working on LGBT issues, who will lead on the LGBT young people's group and activities, as well as embedding LGBT good practice across the Integrated Youth Support Service.

Central Administrative Base – Riverside House

The central administrative function will be based at RMBC Riverside House and will house the Head of IYSS, the Managers for the Safe, Partnership & Youth Development and Learning service strands, as well as the Business Support and Management Information Team. The central base at Riverside House will be available for all staff to utilise as a hot-desking facility.

Activities Base - My Place

The usage of the My Place building in the Town Centre will be optimised for the provision of young people's activities.

Community Based Provision

The hub and spoke model of service provision will represent a shift towards more decentralised delivery, with the spokes of the model having additional resources that will enable young people to access provision locally.

The spokes of the model will be in each of the seven locality areas of the Borough i.e. Wentworth North, Wentworth South, Rotherham South, Wentworth Valley, Rotherham North, Rother Valley South and Rother Valley West. This model maps against Learning Communities, Social Care, Area Assemblies and Ward Structures.

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Each of the seven locality areas will have a multi-disciplinary team that will comprise of a basic team model, which is as follows:

Support for young people

The support team for young people will comprise of 1 FTE Youth Support Worker (Youth Development), 3 FTE Youth Support Workers (Learning), 1 WTE Youth Support Worker (Safe) and 1 FTE Assistant Youth Support Worker.

The support team will undertake high quality interventions either on a one to one basis at home or in a Youth Centre or as part of a group within a Youth Centre or school setting.

The interventions which young people receive will be varied and according to need, but will be with regard to:

- Anti social behaviour
- Offending Behaviour
- Substance Misuse
- Anger Management
- Confidence and Self Esteem
- Healthy Lifestyles
- Bullying
- School Engagement
- Relationships - Family and Social
- Community Cohesion
- Diversity
- Equalities
- Teenage Pregnancy
- NEET support – re-engagement in education and employability
- Access to fun and enjoyable positive activities

Youth work provision

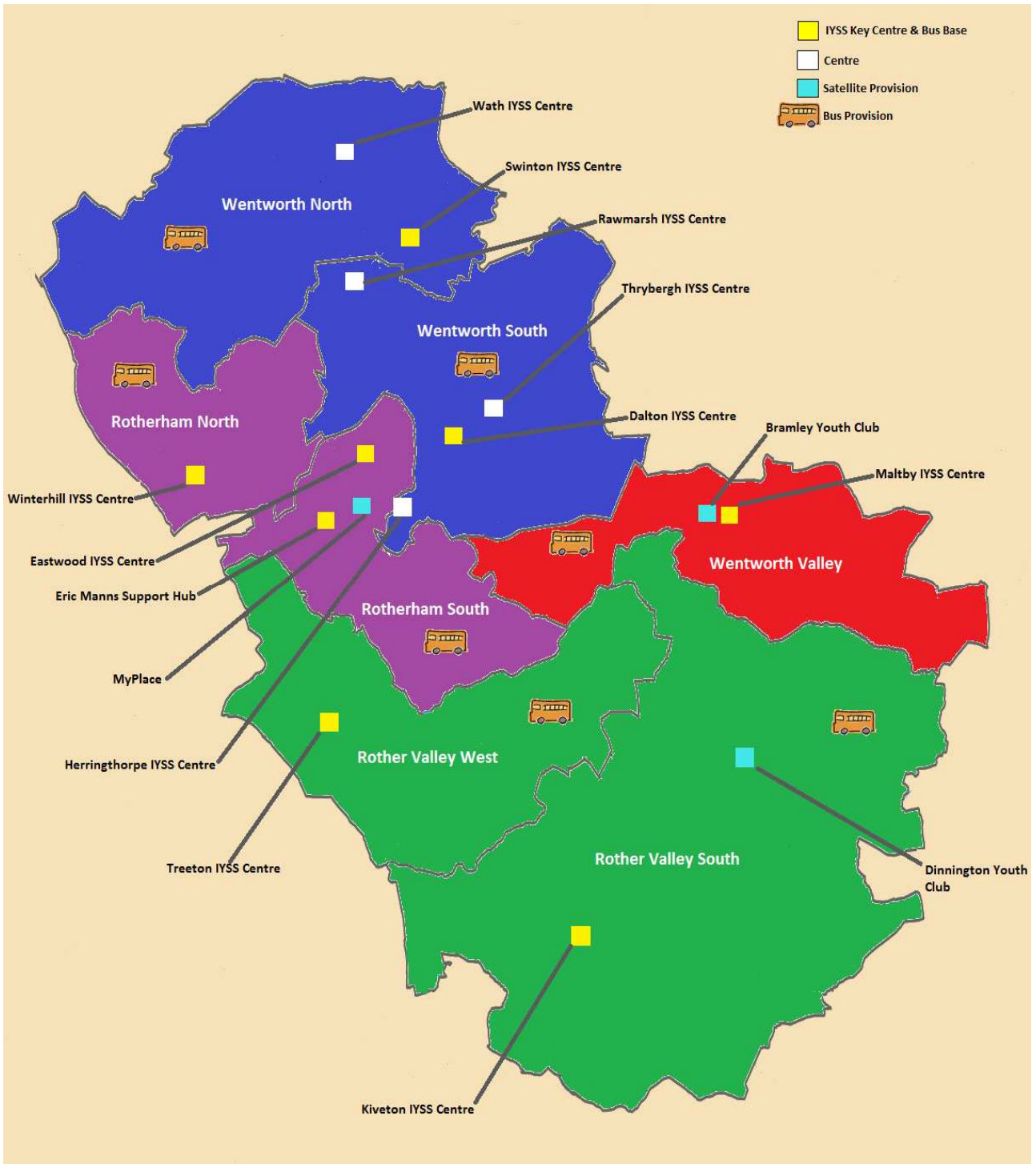
The centre based youth work provision team will consist of 1 FTE Level 1 Youth Worker, 0.5 WTE Level 2 Youth Worker and a 0.2 WTE Support Worker. This team will provide activities within the youth work centres in their respective locality area. These positive activities will support personal and social development and in addition, there will be voice and influence work and volunteering opportunities for young people.

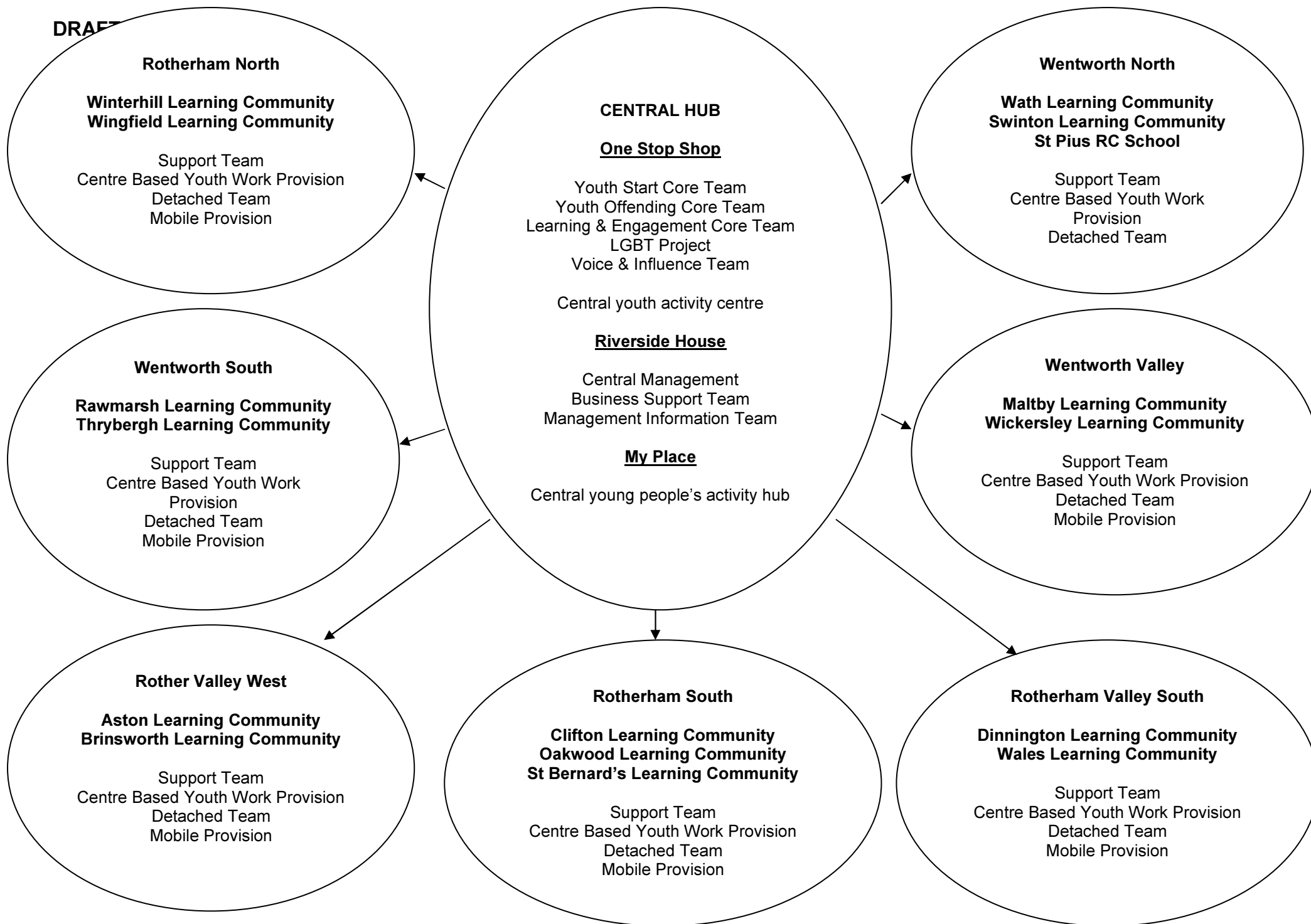
There will be a detached youth work element in each of the locality areas, which will comprise of a 0.7 FTE level 1 Youth Worker, 0.5 FTE level 2 Youth Worker and a 0.04 FTE Support Worker. The detached youth work team will engage with young people in outdoor areas within their localities, offering positive activities and acting as a conduit into centre based activities and IYSS support.

The locality areas will each have mobile provision, which will facilitate increased service coverage.

The map of Integrated Youth Support Service provision is outlined below, together with a more detailed diagram of provision on page 9:

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IYSS Local Offer/Pledge

There will be a minimum offer of Integrated Youth Support Service within each of the seven locality areas and young people can expect a minimum level of service, which is outlined in the IYSS Pledge, which is outlined below:

Promoting personal and social development through activities and opportunities for young people aged 10 -25 and offering support where young people need it.

Our vision:

“Working together to improve the lives of all Rotherham’s children and young people”

Our pledge:

We will:

- Believe in you and treat you with respect
- Help you understand your feelings and to feel good about yourself
- Be open, honest and non judgmental
- Listen to you
- Understand the issues you face and help you get the right support at the right time to make the changes you want to make
- Challenge discrimination in any form
- Talk to you in a way you understand

We offer:

- Positive activities and opportunities that are safe, interesting, challenging, open to all and sometimes accredited
- Opportunities to have real voice and influence by being involved in making decisions and creating change in your communities
- A chance to take part in volunteering opportunities
- Information, guidance, help and support
- Residential, adventure and outdoor opportunities

With additional support if you:

- Need someone to talk to and speak up on your behalf
- Are at risk of re-offending
- Want to get back into learning
- Have a learning disability and are preparing for change
- Want access to high quality information on choices, opportunities and progression routes at 16, 17 and 18

5. Summary

This report provides confirmation of the Community Leadership Fund (CLF) total expenditure for the financial year 2012/13.

The report also provides examples of the type of activity supported by the CLF, in particular related to the key strategic themes of the Council's Corporate Plan.

A full list of all projects supported during 2012/13 is included in Appendix 1 of this report.

7. Proposals and Details

The Community Leadership Fund provides annual funding of £1000 to each ward member. CLF funding is allocated by ward members to address local priorities, support local groups and address emerging issues within their communities. The CLF plays a vital role in enabling ward members to optimise their community leadership role, by actively responding to community issues and supporting voluntary and community groups and organisations in delivering solutions on the ground.

During 2012/13 Members supported nearly 200 individual projects. In addition a number of cross ward initiatives were also supported including Rotherham Neuro Support Group, the Food Crisis Partnership, Rotherham Hard of Hearing, Open Minds Theatre Company and Rotherham Holiday Aid.

Much of the funding is committed to projects and activities that have a direct link with the key strategic themes and objectives of the Council's Corporate Plan. The table below provides examples of this:-

It is clear from the feedback received that the CLF has enabled ward members to be well placed to respond to a range of local concerns and to support local needs and projects. This undoubtedly leads to positive outcomes and relationships with local communities.

To further highlight the value of the Community Leadership Fund this year, ward members have had the opportunity to list the projects they have supported on their own individual information pages on the Councils website. This is regularly updated by the Community Liaison Officer within the Area Partnership Team. It is hoped to develop this further in the future to include project feedback and photographs. In addition to this ward members can now access their latest spending information and project listings on the Councils internal intranet system.

8. Finance

The available CLF funding for 2012/13, including funding carried forward from 2011/12, was £82,620. During 2012/13 ward members allocated £61,372 of funding.

For the financial year 2013/14 ward members were able to carry forward up to £750 each resulting in a carry forward figure of £21,248. This combined with the annual CLF funding for 2013/14 provides a total fund of £84,248.

9. Risks and Uncertainties

The Community Leadership Fund supports grass roots local organisations and the leadership role of the Ward Member and is an effective tool available to ward members to directly address local issues and concerns. Any reduction in funding will have a negative impact on the community leadership role of individual ward councillors particularly at a time when national and regional funding to the voluntary and community sector and is being reduced or withdrawn.

10. Policy and Performance Agenda Implications

The breadth and diversity of projects supported by the Fund contributes to all five strands of the Corporate Plan and in particular to:-

- Making sure no community is left behind
- Helping to create safe and healthy communities.
- Improving the environment
- Ensuring quality education for all

We will ensure that Citizens are satisfied with their community as a place to live
