### 5. Summary

The renegotiation of LAA indicator targets, which forms the refresh element of the annual review, has now been completed, pending approval from central government.

The performance picture is very mixed, a significant number of indicators are on target and performing well, however a substantial number also appear unlikely to reach the target set for 2011. The review has focused on these areas. Cabinet are asked to approve this review, including the revised targets.

### 6. Recommendations

That Cabinet:

- Note the review process that has taken place
- Approve the revised LAA targets, agreed with Government Office as part of the review process
- That Cabinet Members ensure that Directorates are fully aware of amendments to indicators on which they lead and maintain, with support from Chief Executive's and Rotherham Partnership, appropriate improvement plans.

## 7. Proposals and Details

## a. Refresh

Discussions with Government Office on this years LAA review have now been completed and the refreshed LAA now submitted to Communities and Local Government (CLG). A summary table of the completed review is attached at appendix A. The main impact has been on the housing and economic targets, as a result of the recession. Four targets have been successfully renegotiated down with the regional Government Office. These are

In terms of the economic targets all of the following have successfully been negotiated down with Government Office:

- Employment Rate (Achieving Theme)
- Out of work benefits (Achieving Theme)
- New business registration rate (Achieving Theme)
- New homes (Safe Theme)

In the case of the 'new homes' target the Housing Minister John Healy is taking a particular interest in renegotiation of this target across the country and has asked for all renegotiated targets to be submitted personally to him before being forwarded to CLG, so he can be assured that targets remain sufficiently challenging. Rotherham's renegotiated target is currently with the Minister for approval.

### b. Performance

As well as offering a chance to renegotiate targets the annual LAA review presents an opportunity to reflect on progress and performance. This is of particular significance this year as the current LAA only has a little over one year left to run and in the case of some indicators, such as those taken from the new Place Survey and other perception surveys, the final LAA position on which our performance over the three year period will be judged will be finalised before the end of 2010; offering only a little over half a year to influence performance.

The Rotherham Partnership Team alongside colleagues in the Council has traffic light rated each of the thirty three designated (i.e. part of Reward Grant calculations) indicators in terms of their likelihood of delivering against targets. The analysis below provides an overview of local traffic light ratings followed by identification of key issues by exception under each of the five Community Strategy themes. The process of undertaking the review has highlighted a number of areas which require further attention and the Rotherham Partnership's five Theme Boards will be expected to act in respect to these.

### • Overview

As the more detailed analysis below will reveal performance is mixed and this is compounded by the number of indicators where we are unable to accurately assess our current position, or project future performance. Examples of good and weak performance exist across all of the five themes. There is a concentration of 'red' rated indicators under Alive, although several of these are closely linked. There are also a significant number of indicators where we are unclear on current performance, particularly under Proud and Safe, although in some cases data is imminent, which will help to address this. The remainder of this section of the report will look at each of the themes in turn.

## • Achieving

As noted earlier, three economic indicators have been renegotiated as a result of the recession. While the new targets remain extremely challenging and meeting them will be very stretching the 'employment rate' and 'new business registrations' indicators are now rated amber, while **'out of work benefits'** has remained red rated, as it is considered highly unlikely that the revised target will be met. This is for two primary reasons; firstly, less flexibility was granted in renegotiating this target compared to the others; and secondly, the numbers claiming Job Seekers Allowance (JSA) in Rotherham has increased significantly and in a climate characterised by higher unemployment and a more competitive labour market it is increasingly challenging for those who were on out of work benefits prior to the recession and who are likely to be less skilled and job ready to secure employment, and as a result move off benefits. The remaining two achieving LAA indicators, 'CO2 emissions' and 'congestion' are both rated green.

## • Alive

There are ten Local Area Agreement indicators overseen by the Alive Theme Board of which six are currently rated 'red'. These are:

- Under 18 Conception Rate
- All age cause mortality male and female (two indicators)
- Prevalence of breastfeeding (two indicators)
- People supported to live independently by social services

The '**under 18 conception rate**' is a long standing area of contention nationally and is being treated as a special case as few if any areas expect to meet the Government's 50% reduction target. Rotherham has never formally agreed an LAA target against this indicator and GOYH have agreed to remove it from calculations in relation to the LAA Reward Grant for the current LAA and have proposed that we set a more realistic local target outside of the LAA.

There has been an increase in investment and interventions (including the introduction of NHS Healthcheck, better chronic disease management and public health interventions including smoking cessation, weight management and alcohol reduction) to address **'all age all cause mortality'**, and the trend in relation to the indicator for both men and women is positive. However, it is felt that the agreed LAA target is unlikely to be met. Cancer mortality (especially lung cancer) and respiratory disease mortality continue to be the most challenging areas. NHS Rotherham's revised Strategy includes actions to tackle these areas.

There have been significant issues concerning data collection and data quality in relation to the two '**breastfeeding**' indicators, which have impacted on reported performance. Without improvements in the way data is collected it will be difficult to clearly ascertain how we are performing on this indicator. It is a problem which both the Alive Theme Board and NHS Rotherham are keenly aware of.

The 'people supported to live independently by social services' indicator, which is very stretching is currently off target. The first year target was not met and this makes it challenging to meet subsequent yearly targets. A Performance Clinic has been held to try to identify and address performance issues, and the findings and agreed actions from the Clinic fed into the review process. The progress of this will be closely monitored by the Theme Board.

The amber rated '**obesity**' indicator has also been an area of concern. This is a relatively new indicator, introduced in 2008 as part of the Government's National Indicator Set and the variability/inconsistency of the data reported to date makes it very difficult to make predictions about future performance. While there is evidence that obesity interventions are proving very effective on an individual basis it is difficult to understand the impact that this will have on the reported figures. The latest position does show an improvement, however the level of improvement is not statistically significant and only applies to one quarter, against a previous downward trend. As a result of this uncertainty the indicator has been assessed as amber. *Agreed outcome*?

## Learning

There are four LAA indicators falling under the Learning Theme. Of these two are currently rated green; 'achievement of level 2 qualifications at age 19' and '16-18 yr olds not in education, employment or training' –'NEET') as these are performing well and are on target. The remaining two basic skills indicators relating to 'the **percentage of the working age population qualified to levels 3 and 4**' are rated red. This is a result of a number of factors, most notably that there is currently no identified lead agency for either of these indicators that have been owned by the Learning & Skills Council (LSC), whose commissioning role in this area is ending. In addition funding for work-based learning and adult education which support this indicator is declining. The lack of ownership of these indicators is an issue which the Learning Theme Manager and Rotherham Partnership Team are currently looking to resolve.

## • Proud

There are four LAA indicators overseen by the Proud Board, all of which are currently rated amber. All are derived from surveys, three of which are perception based; 'people who believe that people of different backgrounds get on well in their local area' (Place Survey), 'people who believe they can influence local decision making' (Place Survey) and Voluntary and Community Sector organisations who believe that 'local public sector partners contribute positively to their success' (Third Sector Survey). The agreed LAA target for all three is a 'statistically significant level of improvement' by the time of the next survey, which will be undertaken later this year. All are based on new national surveys introduced in 2008 and are currently rated amber due to the lack of available evidence on which to assess performance. However there is new targeted investment and significant activity being undertaken against each of these areas and this is being closely monitored by the Proud Board. The final Proud Theme indicator concerns the 'number of young people participating in **positive activities**'. Rotherham is within the bottom quartile of areas nationally on this measure and performance has recently dipped marginally further. At present there is limited understanding of why our comparative performance is so poor. This is being keenly monitored by the Proud Board, who recently agreed to convene a Performance Clinic to look in greater detail at the indicator and agree actions.

## • Safe

The Safe Theme Board oversees a total of ten designated LAA indicators. Of these five are rated green, four amber and one red. The red indicator is '**new homes**', which, as described earlier, was re-negotiated due to the impact of the recession and is now more realistic. This may lead to a re-rating of the indicator by the Safe Theme.

Of the four indicators rated amber, three were rated green by GOYH. These were 'drug users in effective treatment', 'proportion of principal roads were maintenance should be considered' and '% of non-decent Council homes'. In the case of the first two of these an amber rating has been assigned due to a lack of currently available data on which to base a judgement. There is a concern in relation to 'principal roads' as the figures are based on a survey of road conditions which are likely to have been effected by the recent bad weather conditions. In relation to 'non-decent homes' the ability to meet the target depends on the budget allocated to decent homes works and not been finalised when this report was drafted.

The final amber indicator is '**perceptions of anti-social behaviour**'. This is rated amber due to a lack of available data – the survey on which the measure is based has only been carried out once in 2008 (the Place Survey). However an Anti-Social Behaviour Action Plan does exist and a significant amount of partnership work has been undertaken aimed at improving perceptions. In addition several initiatives have been commissioned to address this area and the Safe Theme Board has named this their number one priority, which has led the Board to seek funds via LAA Reward Grant to support it. The outcome of the Safe Theme proposal for funding may be known by the time this meeting takes place.

### 8. Finance

There is up to £2 million of LAA Reward Grant available under the terms of the current LAA 2008-11. The way in which Reward Grant is calculated has changed and is significantly more complicated than in the previous round. The Rotherham Partnership Team are currently working with colleagues in RMBC to estimate the level of Reward Grant the Partnership would be likely to secure under different performance scenarios. Although it has been delayed, Government are set to release a 'Reward Grant calculator' in April 2010 which should assist with this and make clearer the full financial implications. Although the detailed work referred to above has not yet been undertaken the sense is that on current performance we would be unlikely to secure very much of the available £2 million.

The indicators contained in the LAA cover all of the corporate Themes and Directorates and represent top priorities for Rotherham expressed in the Sustainable Community Strategy 2008-11. LAA performance has implications for external assessments in particular the Corporate Area Assessment (CAA) and associated RMBC 'Organisational Assessment'.

## 11. Background Papers and Consultation

### 5. Summary

The Homes and Communities Agency (HCA) is the national housing and regeneration agency for England. Its principal business process is the "Single Conversation" with Local Authorities, who are expected to put forward the shared ambitions and objectives on behalf of their Local Strategic Partnerships.

The focus of the Single Conversation is around comprehensive place-shaping, including the full range of housing, infrastructure, regeneration and community facilities. It is important that this process is not seen primarily as a housing issue, but rather an issue of how improvements in infrastructure and housing can contribute to and compliment aspirations to improve wider quality of life issues. Council's are required to develop a Local Investment Plan, which will form the basis of a funding agreement between the HCA and the Local Authorities.

The report also sets out the rationale and progress on rewriting the Rotherham Housing Strategy, which will enhance its status as a key component to the Single Conversation.

### 6. Recommendation

That Cabinet:

- Notes the Key Dates associated with the Single Conversation
- Recognises the importance of revising the existing Housing Strategy to enhance its status as a key component of the Single Conversation
- Refers the report to Full Cabinet and the Local Strategic Partnership Board to ensure that wider Members and Chief Officers comprehend the strategic and corporate significance of the Single Conversation
- Supports the proposed officer lead and governance structures for the Single Conversation

## 7. Proposals and Details

The Homes and Communities Agency (HCA) is the national housing and regeneration agency for England. Its principal business process is the "Single Conversation" with Local Authorities, who are expected to put forward the shared ambitions and objectives on behalf of their Local Strategic Partnerships.

The focus of the Single Conversation is around comprehensive place-shaping, including the full range of housing, infrastructure, regeneration and community facilities. Council's are required to develop a Local Investment Plan, which will form the basis of a funding agreement between the HCA and the Local Authorities.

For a successful and coherent Single Converstaion the Council must ensure that partner organisations seeking funding for the three year period 2011-2014 and beyond are understood and reflected in a coherent set of priorities to which all beneficiaries are fully signed up.

The first round of Yorkshire and Humber Region's Single Conversations are now well advanced with the Leeds City Region, Hull and Sheffield. To maintain a coherent South Yorkshire regeneration investment programme it is important Rotherham, Barnsley and Doncaster's first workshops with the HCA start soon.

Officers are closely monitoring the progress of both Sheffield and Hull and the HCA fed back to the Rotherham Core Group their experiences of the process to date at a meeting on 6<sup>th</sup> January 2010.

It emerged during that meeting that senior officer buy-in to the process is fundamental to demonstrating that this is corporately viewed as a strategic priority for the LA and the partners it represents. It is proposed that the Strategic Director for Neighbourhood and Adult Services will lead the main workshops with representation of key thematic leads from health, transport economy, children and young people adult services, safety, housing, finance and the Chief Executives department in attendance

Also it became clear that the HCA favours a single lead officer and point of contact at each authority who is able to articulate the Council's vision and to create a 'pen portrait' of the authority at the first workshop. To this end the Sustainable Communities Manager in Neighbourhood Investment Services has been tasked with the role.

### 7.1 Housing Strategy Refresh

Aligned with the importance of engaging in the Single Conversation to unlock regeneration and growth funding is that of having a robust Housing Strategy. The existing strategy was adopted as recently as 2008. This was at a time of peak housing markets when the main concerns were to close the widening affordability gap and make the most of allocations available from the funds now brought together under the HCA umbrella; the strategy therefore preceded the dramatic economic downturn into recession.

A new Housing Strategy is needed to both reflect the new economic realities and to address the emerging challenge of climate change. It will address:

- **Sustainable Communities:** investing wisely in the physical infrastucture of our communiities to achieve the highest standards of quality and design whilst supporting work to adress other issues such as raising educational attainment and aspirations, tackling worklessness, health inequalities, and promoting safe and inclusive communities.
- **Growth:** how Rotherham will respond to its status within a New Growth Point.
- **Renewal:** how, where appropriate, we will complete existing projects and examine the case for new ones.
- Affordable Housing: how we intend to develop a programme of affordable house enablement through direct council house building, work with Housing Associations and by reacting to opportunities presented by the housing market., in response to the collspse in supply of open market housing through planning gain.
- **Climate Change:** how we will strive to tackle the greenhouse gas emissions arising from existing housing whilst ensuring that new development achieves the highest possible standards and promoting the Dearne Valley as a new form of Eco-Town.

Our Emerging new strategy will align with the HCAs Investment Plan, Audit Commission 'Building Better Lives' guidance document and the South Yorkshire Housing Strategy. In doing so it will respond to Rotherhams local priorities and ambitions.

The development of our new strategy will follow corporate guidance on consultation and cummunity engagement and members are being engaged in the process from the outset. Cross directorate meetings have been taking place to ensure a corporate approach,.

In collaboration with neighbouring authorities, a South Yorkshire Forward Strategy and Investment Plan 2010-14 is being developed by Transform South Yorkshire on behalf of the four authorities. This will serve as a sub-regional platform for supporting the local authorities in their respective Conversations. Our revised Housing Strategy is to be structured to align with this sub-regional statement, emphasising Rotherham's unique attributes within the wider city region.

## 7.2 Key Milestones

The key milestones in the Single Conversation process including the revised Housing Strategy are outlined below:

- 25<sup>th</sup>, 26<sup>th</sup>, 27<sup>th</sup> January 10
- January to end May 10
- 18th March 2010
- July 2010
- September 2010
- October 2010

## 8. Finance

The HCA commands funds formerly allocated by English Partnerships, The Housing Corporation, Regional Housing Boards, Communities and Local Government, and the Academy for Sustainable Communities. As a One Stop Shop for future funding, the HCA's support is critical to achieving Rotherham's ambitions across Housing and Growth and success will complement the advance of corporate priorities across Education, Health and Economic Development.

The HCA, within its current programme administers over £17billion nationally. Rotherham is drawing down a significant proportion of this money through programmes such as Decent Homes, Affordable Housing Projects, Council House Building, Kick Start initiatives, Housing Market Renewal, private sector housing support and funds to support regereratrion officers in EDS and the Neighbourhood Investment Team.

The Single Conversation will reach agreement on a funding period that starts in March 2011 and runs for a 3 years. There is currently a great deal of uncertainty around the level of funding to be made available in this period due to a series of national financial pressures, Comprehensive Spending Review (CSR) and potential change in government.

There may be implications for the Council's commitment to engage in prudential borrowing and to make active use of its land and property assets arising from future allocations of funds to the Borough Council. Further reports will address these issues in detail.

## 9. **Risks and Uncertainties**

There is considerable uncertainty about the future of the HCA in the event of a change in national administration. Whatever the outcome of the forthcoming general election the budgets allocated to the HCA will be re-assessed from the need to align public debts with future economic and monetary policies.

Whatever the outcome of the election it is unlikely that all funding will be withdrawn, as housing renewal and growth receives cross party support as does the pressing need to close the gap between housing supply and demand.

### **10. Policy and Performance Agenda Implications**

The HCA Guidance Framework stresses the holistic place-based approach that it wishes local authorities to adopt, stressing the links between housing, infrastructure, regeneration and community activity. It follows that a corporate approach to definition of the Local Investment Plan is a pre-requisite with particular emphasis on alignment with the emerging Local Development Framework Core Strategy and areas of significant budgetary investment such as Building Schools for the Future and Transport.

The same considerations apply in relation to other public priorities as identified through the Rotherham Partnership, including health and spatial health inequalities.

This Single Conversation process can help us to make effective use of our assets and manage them to best effect. It contributes to the Sustainable Neighbourhood's agenda by addressing identified housing issues and will help deliver better choice and quality of affordable housing to the community.

The process therefore has the potential to contribute towards all our key corporate strategic themes of:-

- Rotherham Achieving
- Rotherham Learning

- Rotherham Alive
- Rotherham Safe
- Rotherham Proud
- Fairness
- Sustainable Development
