Plan for producing CCG 2016/17 Annual Commissioning plan

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
Purpose:

- To reflect on the production of the 2015/16 annual Commissioning Plan
- To recommend how the CCG should produce a new plan for 2016/17 and beyond

Background:

The CCG constitution requires an annual Commissioning Plan recommended to the CCG Governing Body by the GP Members Committee. The plan is required to be endorsed by the Health and Well Being Board and is then subject to discussion with NHS England.

Figure one shows the stakeholders involved:



The 2015/16 plan and process had the following strengths:

- Plan was endorsed by all relevant partners / groups
- Strategy and plan received positive feedback in external stakeholder survey
- Engagement with localities (e.g. via Chief Officer and Chair of GP Members Committee attendance at locality meetings) resulted in increased knowledge of and involvement in the plan, evidenced by feedback in the 360 stakeholder survey.
 Despite this however 7 practices did not feel sufficiently involved.
- Staff survey showed high degree of awareness among CCG staff
- NHS England gave strong positive feedback

In 2016/17 the following areas could have been improved:

- Sometimes hard to see explicit read through from public and patient comments to completed plan
- Awareness of key aspects of plan still low among clinicians at main providers
- Turnover of key staff and approach of communicating at Chief Executive level meant limited awareness of plan amongst partner's operational level officers

Analysis of key issues and of risks

The intentions of the new government and NHS England are likely to become clearer over the next few months, it is expected that NHS England will set out 'must be dones' and 2016/17 financial allocations by the end of December. The CCG will be expected to have a 5 year outline plan and a one year detailed plan. However, it may be that there will be an expectation to have a detailed plan for more than one year.

The CCG 2015/16 plan gives a starting point for discussions and all feedback already received will be taken forward into the 2016/17 plan.

The CCG has developed its interim Primary Care Strategy which was approved by the CCG Governing Body in September. The high level aspects of the Primary Care Strategy will be included in the overall CCG Commissioning Plan.

In May 2015 RMBC set out a timetable for a fresh start for RMBC and partnership arrangements. Some of the milestones in that document are reflected in this plan.

In light of the organisational changes occurring in Rotherham organisations the CCG feels it is important to set out to CCG officers, GP members, co-commissioners and partners the timelines the CCG will work to in the 2016/17 planning round so that stakeholders can input effectively.

Officers responsible are to make best use of existing meetings to publicise the overall timescales for the 2016/17 plan and then to have detailed discussions about relevant elements of the 2016/17 plan.

Appendix A presents the Rotherham CCG overview plan for a plan timeline.
