Aim/Scope

To consult on the proposed increase in charges for the provision of Day Care and Transport for Adult Care with the aim of moving towards recovering the full cost of providing the service(s).

What equality information is available? Include any engagement undertaken and identify any information gaps you are aware of. What monitoring arrangements have you made to monitor the impact of the policy or service on communities/groups according to their protected characteristics?

A report to Commissioners in March 2016 on the review of non-residential care charges highlighted that charges for day care and transport to and from a day centre were heavily subsidised and low when compared with our nearest neighbours. Proposals were therefore put forward to Members to consult with customers for a phased increase.

Day Care charges are subject to a financial assessment and currently 56% of customers do not pay towards the cost of their service. However, the charge for transport is a flat rate charge paid by all customers. Information is available in the Adult Care Charging Policy on how we charge for these services. All customers receive an annual review of their care plan and this will include a financial assessment regarding the ability to pay towards the cost of the services they receive. A customers' income will not be reduced below the basic level of Income Support or the Guarantee Credit of Pension Credit plus a further allowance of 25%.

The key findings from the consultation were as follows:

Increase the day care charge from £4.47 to £15 per session from 1 January 2017:

- 56% strongly disagreed
- 27% disagreed
- 14% agreed
- 2% strongly agreed
- 1% did not respond

<u>Increase the day care charge to £30 from 1 October 2017:</u>

- 66% strongly disagreed
- 25% disagreed
- 6% agreed
- 2% strongly agreed
- 1% did not respond

Increase the transport charge from £3.50 to £5 per return journey

- 32% strongly disagreed
- 24% disagreed
- 38% agreed
- 4% strongly agreed
- 2% did not respond

Increase the transport charge from £5 to £10 per return journey

- 56% strongly disagreed
- 29% disagreed
- 10% agreed
- 2% strongly agreed
- 3% did not respond

Overall, 80% of responses disagreed with the proposed increases in charges.

The Analysis

The provision of day care including transport to and from a day centre meets the assessed care needs of vulnerable adults both older people and people with disabilities. At present the income received from charges does not recover the full cost of providing the service and therefore charges to customers are significantly subsidised. Following a review of these charges which included benchmarking against our comparator authorities the proposal to increase charges for day acre and transport were discussed in a report to Commissioners in March 2016.

Currently, 56% of customers do not pay towards the cost of their day care service after undertaking a financial assessment.

The proposed increases would affect 38 customers out of the current 2934 who receive a non-residential care service. Currently only 2 customers pay the maximum charge of £417 per week and 144 (4.9%) pay above £100 per week. This will not change if any of the proposals are approved.

In respect of charges for transport as this is not subject to a financial assessment as it is part of everyone's normal living expenses, any increase would be payable by everyone who uses the service.
