Details of Proposal (including implications on service delivery)	The £25k reduction is Public Health's contribution of an existing much larger homelessness budget of £220.239. The implications on homelessness services will not be noticeable as other sources of funding via the Housing Revenue Account (HRA) and external grants will be utilised to provide an enhanced homelessness service in 2018/19.
Implications on other Services (identify which services and possible impact)	This funding contributes towards Adult Social Care and Housing; homelessness service that delivers all aspects of homeless prevention.
	The Housing Revenue Account will be spent on additional staffing resources to increase capacity in the Housing Options Service. This will provide support to prevent homelessness and will also help prepare for introduction of the Homelessness Reduction Act.
	In 2017/2018 additional Government funding has been received to support the new Homelessness Reduction Act duties. This will also help to replace the loss of funding from public health. The new grant funding is as follows:

The Flexible Homelessness Support Grant and New Burdens Funding will support the introduction and new duties of the Homelessness Reduction Act. This will include all prevention activities such as support and advice to all homeless households or those threatened with homeless irrespective of priority need.	
The public Health funding paid for:	
 Top up payments to secure private rented accommodation Administration charges for private rented accommodation when the applicant is unable to afford the payment themselves Cold weather provision Additional staff time where outreach work is completed at Clearways, Probation, Swallownest Court, Prison Additional staff time to support CSE victims and liaison with all agencies involved, including attendance at meetings Additional staff time to liaise with private landlords/lettings agents and housing providers to support people with complex needs to sustain their tenancies Identifying and working with rough sleepers 	
The Flexible Homelessness Support Grant and New Burdens Funding will cover the cost of the above. It is also proposed that this funding cover other prevention measures including new prevention officers, bond and rent in advance schemes and additional outreach work.	
The Rough Sleeper Funding will be utilised to pay for a Development Coordinator who will work sub regionally and support the work of the Prevention Officers in identifying rough sleepers and carrying out assessments to support individuals in a personalised way.
