Adoption of the Supplementary Planning Documents (SPDs) will provide additional guidance for implementing a range of adopted Local Plan policies. They will be used by applicants submitting planning applications across the borough. The outcome will be planning decisions which comply with relevant planning policies and which will have an impact on residents, workers, visitors or other users of any future development.

The SPDs are intended to provide further guidance to all applicants applying for planning permission as to how adopted Local Plan policies will be implemented and planning decisions made. As such the documents will provide assistance to all, regardless of their protected characteristic(s).

The SPDs are independent of the protected characteristics of a person. There is no evidence that there will be a differential impact based on the protected characteristics of a person. However, the Equal and Healthy Communities SPD provides specific advice for developers when submitting planning applications. This will assist in assessing the impact
