Local Government Ombudsman Report

1. Background

- 1.1 The Council has received a Report from the Local Government Ombudsman (LGO) that makes a finding of Maladministration.
- 1.2 The LGO has directed that the Report be kept confidential as disclosing the Report would identify those to whom it relates. As a consequence, the Report will be considered by the Committee in private.

2. Key Issues

- 2.1 This Report sets out why the Council is required to hold this section of the Meeting in Private.
- 2.2 Section 30(3) of the Local Government Act 1974 requires the LGO to report without naming or identifying the complainant or other individuals. The people involved in this complaint are therefore referred to by a letter or job role in Report that is provided. There is a general rule that Council's cannot disclose any information to third parties that could identify the complainant or other individuals referred to in the Report.
- 2.3 The LGO have further powers under Section 30(7) of the Local Government Act 1974 to direct that a report is not made available to members of the public or advertised in the press.
- 2.4 This direction includes a requirement that the Council's formal consideration of the report does not make public the content of the Report.
- 2.5 The Council's general approach for confidential matters is to ensure that we release as much information as possible however in light of the Direction the whole of this item should be considered in confidential session. Should the Committee decide to consider this item in open session this would be likely to breach the right to a private and family life contained in the Human Rights Act 1998 in addition to the Direction described above.

3. Options considered and recommended proposal

- 3.1 There are 2 options available to the Committee to consider the matter in open or confidential session.
- 3.2 In light of the Direction of the Ombudsman it would be unlawful for the Council to consider this matter in open session and therefore the recommendation is made for the Committee to consider the issue in confidential session.

4. Consultation on proposal

4.1 There has been no consultation on this proposal as the Direction has come from the LGO.
