1. Background

- 1.1 Housing development can have a significant impact on local education infrastructure and create a shortfall in available school places for local schools and within local communities. The Town and Country Planning Act 1990 (Section 106) makes provision for Local Authorities to seek financial contributions from developers towards education infrastructure where it can be evidenced that a development will put pressure on existing school capacity.
- 1.2 The Section 106 Developer Education Contributions Policy sets out the Council's strategy towards analysing the impact on education and requesting developer contributions towards creating additional school places where necessary and appropriate.

2. Key Issues

- 2.1 There is a statutory duty on Local Authorities under the requirements of the Education Act 1996 to ensure the sufficiency of school places in their area within funding parameters.
- 2.2 Rotherham has a historic profile of satisfying parental preferences on Primary and Secondary School entry National Offer Days annually that is broadly in line with statistical Neighbours and above the national average.
- A lack of sufficiency in areas of need can lead to parents being unable to secure a place locally for their child(ren) meaning that places have to be sought further afield potentially impacting on the Council's home to school transport budget and National Offer Day allocation profiles.
- The latest cost multipliers issued by Department for Education and BCIS (Building Cost Information Service) have uplifted the previous cost formula from £3,472 to £5,455 for Primary, whilst Secondary remains £3,737 and £1,621 for Sixth Form. The policy revision reflects the uplift.
- A previous Cabinet report in December 2022 regarding update to the S106 Education Developer contributions policy stated that 'In future these costs will be updated annually to reflect increases in build costs and as good practice in negotiating S106 planning contributions'. This report is prepared in relation to such an update.

3. Options considered and recommended proposal

3.1 Leave the S106 Education Developer Contributions Policy as it is. This was last updated in December 2022 and references figures that have been outdated by more recent Department for Education Guidance.

The impact would be that education contributions that are sought

aligned with new development are below those recommended to support education infrastructure requirements.

3.2 Recommended- the revised Section 106 Developer Education Contributions Policy is approved to reflect the most up to date cost formula and ensure that appropriate education contributions are sought from housing development to support education infrastructure.

4. Consultation on proposal

4.1 Consultation has taken place with relevant Officers within School Organisation, Legal and Planning departments.

- 6.1 The cost multipliers issued by the Department for Education (DfE) and BCIS (Building Cost Information Service) are used to assist property developers / agents in establishing the potential levels of S106 contributions. It should be noted that these calculators are for guidance only and do not determine the final value of contributions.
- The uplift in the cost multipliers would result in future increases in S106 contributions in line with rises in build costs. This would ensure that the council receives sufficient funding from developers to cover costs of the capital works.
- There are no direct procurement implications arising from the recommendations detailed in this report.
- 7. Legal Advice and Implications (to be written by Legal Officer on behalf of Assistant Director Legal Services)
- 7.1 The s.106 Education Contribution Policy sets out the Council's Strategy for analysing the impact of new developments on education provision within the borough. The Strategy provides the necessary evidence to allow officers to judge the need caused by new developments to ensure the sufficiency of school places. This calculated need can then be translated into a financial contribution to be secured by way of a s.106 Agreement pursuant to the Town and

Country Planning Act 1990 as amended payable by the Developer to the Council where it can be justified.

There is a statutory duty under the Education Act 1996 for the Council to ensure the sufficiency of school places. There is also a legal requirement embedded with s.106 of the Town and Country Planning Act that any request for an education contribution should be reasonable, fully justifiable and linked to the Development. Such a request can only be justified by up to date evidence, such evidence in relation to any harm caused by development in relation to the efficiency of school places can be justified by the updated s.106 Developer Education Contributions Policy.

8. Human Resources Advice and Implications

8.1 There are no direct HR implications within this report.

9. Implications for Children and Young People and Vulnerable Adults

9.1 Contributions from developers are sought, where the Council can evidence a shortfall in school places will occur as a result of future development. Section 106 contributions and other funding streams such as basic need funding (allocated to local authorities for the provision of new school places) are used for the provision of new school places to meet demand and are accompanied by strict contractual arrangements including timeframes for the utilisation of funding.

10. Equalities and Human Rights Advice and Implications

- 10.1 The Council Plan theme supported by the proposal is to ensure every child is able to fulfil their potential. This is supported by providing school places in areas of need and in line with parental wishes.
- 10.2 An equalities impact assessment has been completed and is Appendix 2 to this report.
