Background		

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is to confirm the content of the BCF Quarter 1 Template (Appendix 1) which has been submitted to NHS England regarding the spend and outputs of Rotherham's Discharge Fund for 2024/25.
- 1.2 The overall delivery of the Better Care Fund continues to have a positive impact and improves joint working between health and social care in Rotherham.

# **Key Issues**

- 2.1 The Discharge Fund is to support timely and safe discharge from hospital into the community by reducing the number of people delayed in hospital.
- 2.2 Rotherham Place has received £2.473 million of the discharge funding. Rotherham Council has also been allocated £3.384 million of the discharge fund. Therefore, this amounts to a total of £5.857 million of funding for Rotherham Place partners for 2024/25.
- 2.3 These funds are required to be pooled into the local Better Care Fund (BCF) plans and Section 75 agreements.
- 2.4 The BCF Quarter 1 template for 2024/25 covers reporting on spend and outputs of the Local Authority and ICB Discharge Fund only.
- 2.5 Spend and Activity

Actual expenditure and outputs delivered to date is included within the BCF Q1 template.

Expenditure will be carefully monitored throughout the year and reallocated according to need.

## **Key Actions and Relevant Timelines**

- 3.1 The Better Care Fund Executive Group held on 29th August 2024 approved (on behalf of the Health and Wellbeing Board) the:
  - (i) Documentation for submission to NHS England (NHSE) on 29th August 2024.

### **Implications for Health Inequalities**

Addressing health inequalities is integral to the allocation of BCF resource and funded schemes. 4.1 This includes contributing to achieving the strategic aims of developing healthy lifestyles and prevention pathways, supporting prevention and early diagnosis of chronic conditions and targeting variation.

BCF funded schemes which reduce health inequalities include social prescribing, Breathing Space and project support for the implementation of Population Health Management (PHM) priorities.
