To seek approval to dispose of 54 sq metres of land currently used by the owner of 61 Keeton Hall Road, Kiveton Park for the use of off-road vehicular parking and garden space. The owner of 61 Keeton Hall Road has applied to purchase the land as it wasn't included within their original Right To Buy acquisition from the Council. The Assistant Director of Housing has approved the disposal.

The proposed purchaser has used the land as part of their off-road parking area and rear garden space since they have rented the property from the Council. However when the enquirer purchased the property through the Right to Buy scheme part of the land was not included within the sale although the enquirer has continued to utilise it. A similar transaction has previously took place with the owner(s) of No. 59 Keeton Hall Road who purchased a similar adjacent plot of land to allow them to used as extra off road parking

and to erect a garage on the site. The disposal of this land and its continued use to provide off road parking and rear garden area should not result in any additional implications to the whole or wider community or the public at large.
