Have there been or likely to be any public concerns regarding the proposal?

Over the past 3.5 years the service has undertaken in-depth consultation with communities across the borough. This consultation has shown that residents are keen for a wider range of accessible creative, cultural and sports activities that they can take part in safely within their own neighbourhoods. It has also shown that residents value their existing community infrastructure (for example, community groups, youth clubs, etc), and want these settings to be supported and promoted.

If approved, this proposal will make Micro-Grants accessible to a wide range of

community groups and organisations across the Rotherham borough. This funding will enable them to run a free and diverse public programme of creative and active events. As such, the proposal is highly likely to be welcomed by the public.

## Could the proposal have implications regarding the accessibility of services to the whole or wider community?

The proposal is to allocate funding through a Community Micro-Grants programme. This programme is open to community groups and organisations across the Rotherham borough. It invites them to submit proposals to deliver creative and/or active events and activities from March – June 2025 as part of the Children's Capital of Culture Festival Year. Funded activities must be free and open to the public, and must be suitable for children, young people, and/or family audiences. As such, if approved the proposal will increase the range and accessibility of engagement and enrichment activity available to the wider community.

### Could the proposals affect service users?

Local Authority services cannot be directly funded through the Community Micro-Grants programme. However, if the proposal is supported, it is likely to enable a larger and more diverse offer of activities and events for service users – for example, through funding groups who plan to deliver activities within libraries, green spaces, or other Council-run venues and settings. As such there is likely to be an increase in engagement and participation opportunities for children, young people and communities across Council

services, particularly within Culture, Sport and Tourism.

# Has there been or is there likely to be an impact on an individual or group with protected characteristics?

The overarching Children's Capital of Culture programme is designed and delivered in partnership with children and young from a diverse range of backgrounds. It is led by a Cultural Partnership Board with diverse representation from organisations across the public, private and third sector in Rotherham. The programme aims to achieve systems change in which the voice and influence of children and young people is embedded in cultural delivery.

The Micro-Grants are open to all community groups and organisations across Rotherham who meet the fund's simple eligibility criteria. The Micro-Grants will fund a diverse range of activity across all 25 of Rotherham's wards. As such, it is likely that the proposal will have a positive impact on individuals and groups with protected characteristics, as it is will:

- enable a larger and more diverse programme of free activities to take place in localities, meeting people 'where they are at'
- enable a larger and more diverse programme of free activities aimed at children, young people and families (addressing the protected characteristic of 'age')
- fund several groups and organisations with a specific focus on positively supporting individuals and groups with protected characteristics

Examples of groups that have been proposed to be funded through the programme which have a specific focus on supporting individuals and groups with protected characteristics include:

- Rotherham Parent Carer Forum (Disability)
- ArtWorks (Disability)
- Rotherham Hindu Community (Faith)
- The Big Sisterz (Sex)

### How have you considered equality and diversity?

The proposal will provide a public programme of creative and active events that is accessible to all children, young people and their families, regardless of background and lived experience. Activities will take place across all 25 wards, and all activities are free at the point of access to ensure that economic disadvantage is limited.

It is recognised that children and young people from marginalised backgrounds may face other barriers to engagement. The Equalities Action Plan set out in Part B provides a series of actions for the overarching Children's Capital of Culture programme, which are embedded throughout the service's provision including delivery of the Community Micro-Grants programme. This Action Plan seeks to improve access for marginalised groups and ensure that the Children's Capital of Culture programme has equality, diversity and inclusion at its heart.

### Key findings

Significant work has already been undertaken to ensure that Children's Capital of Culture maintains and embeds its commitment to ensuring the voice, influence and creativity of children and young people is at the heart of this programme. Wide-ranging consultation

and engagement has already taken place across the borough, however there are some known gaps and missing voices within this work which are being addressed through the next stage of the programme development; updates related to this work can be found in the overarching Equalities Action Plan for the whole Children's Capital of Culture programme, which is set out in Part B.

Delivery of a free and diverse Community Micro-Grants programme across all of Rotherham's 25 wards will help ensure a wider range of access, participation and engagement.

#### Actions

The Equalities Action Plan for the service was first drawn up in May 2024, and since then has been periodically updated to track progress against our targets and propose new actions to improve the accessibility, participation in, and engagement with the service. The February 2025 updates can be found in the accompanying Part B.

The Equalities Action Plan sets out a series of measures for addressing equality, diversity and inclusion through two key areas:

- Overarching programme activities that are embedded across the programme
- Specific and targeted activities to address the audience gaps identified in the Equalities Assessment
