3.1 Aim/Scope (who the Policy/Service affects and intended outcomes if known)

The intended outcome is to enhance the support to victims-survivors of domestic abuse and to comply with the Domestic Abuse Act 2021 statutory duty.

3.2 What equality information is available? (Include any engagement undertaken)

The Domestic Abuse Act 2021 requires authorities to effectively commission services based on a local strategy informed by a robust needs assessment.

A detailed needs assessment was carried out in 2021 and submitted to the Ministry of Housing Communities and Local Government. A review and refreshment were also submitted to the MHCLG in 2025.

MHCLG provide a recommended template and guidance for conducting the needs assessment. Ongoing monitoring and performance management provides information on how the new duties are working and to understand where there may be challenges and how the funding is being used.

The needs assessment facilitates local authorities to consider the specific support needs of all victims in its area, including those with particular protected characteristics, and/or multiple complex needs.

An equality analysis was also undertaken in 2021 to inform the development of the new Domestic Abuse Strategy 2022-25. The equality analysis was informed by several engagement events, the outcomes of which contributed to the development of the DA

strategy and were used to inform the proposals for use of the Government new burdens funding.

They are listed below:

- Market Engagement (2021)
- IDVA Engagement (2020)
- Rotherham Rise Engagement (2020)
- Victim Engagement (Refuge) (2020) (Victims have protected characteristics)
- Victim Engagement (Rotherham Rise) (2020) and the BMER service
- Key Stakeholders and Voluntary Groups Engagement – Housing, Commissioning, Voluntary Sector, SYP, NHS (2021)

Equality information and the outcomes of consultation and engagement informed the transformation of domestic abuse services (in-house and commissioned services) and the new service model which commenced on 1 October 2022.

There have been subsequent consultation events recently take place to inform the ongoing refreshed 2027 strategy:

- Rotherham Rise service user engagement - October 2024
- Domestic Abuse Assertive Outreach service user engagement – October 2024
- DH housing officer service user surveys – October 2024
- Stakeholder and Voluntary groups / Domestic and Sexual Abuse Priority group consultation / workshop November 2024

Extensive consultation was undertaken with public and partners stakeholders in 2024 to review the Safer Rotherham Partnership priorities and plan for 2025-2028. Crime types included in the review included domestic abuse, stalking and harassment, sexual abuse, violence against a person and violence against women and girls. The outcome of the consultation was used to inform the development of the Safer Rotherham Partnership Plan 2025-28 and associated actions and performance indicators.

An annual Joint Strategic Intelligence Assessment is carried out which is a thorough and analysis of crime and other partner data and information. This is considered by the partnership Domestic and Sexual Abuse Priority Group who are involved in the annual review of SRP priorities in relating to domestic abuse.

Quarterly contract monitoring meetings are held with the contracted DA service provider where data and information about the quality-of-service provision is discussed to ensure that services are meeting the needs of DA victims/survivors, including protected characteristic groups.

Quarterly meetings of the SRP Domestic and Sexual Abuse Priority Group are held, including relevant DA partners and voluntary and community sector representatives where performance data is discussed, including data by protected characteristic group.

Findings from community engagement and consultation have been consistent and have been used in the design of strategies and services. For example:

- Outcomes from the Needs Assessment included:
 - A victim should never be left without specialist domestic abuse support. On-call weekend support should be made available to anyone presenting as homeless. All victims of domestic abuse deserve specialist support and shelter inside a safe environment.
 - A specialist domestic abuse and housing support officer to be allocated to a victim presenting as homeless.
 - Service users deserve a seamless journey through domestic abuse support services. Victims of domestic abuse should be supported by a single support worker to guide them through the entirety of their journey through the service, regardless of the fluctuations of their risk levels.
 - Homeless victims should have access to support packages of essential items such as food, baby clothes, etc.
 - Every victim of domestic abuse deserves their specific needs to be met. To effectively support service users with complex needs, the service should seek to undertake a second assessment alongside the Domestic Abuse, Stalking and Harassment form (DASH) at the first point of contact, that would operate as a 'Chaos Indicator' to ascertain the level of vulnerability of the service user, and thus what type of additional support needs they may require

The outcomes of the Safer Rotherham Partnership consultations also provided consistent results between various stakeholder groups including the importance of prevention and early intervention initiatives; improved support services for victims and families; action to disrupt potential offenders and training and awareness raising for workers and professionals to “spot the signs” and make appropriate referrals.

3.3 Are there any gaps in the information that you are aware of?

No – quarterly performance management information is reported to the domestic abuse partnership group. This enables any gaps in information to be identified and addressed on an ongoing basis.

3.4 What monitoring arrangements have you made to monitor the impact of the policy or service on communities/groups according to their protected characteristics?

Projects submit monitoring data on a monthly/quarterly basis as appropriate. Contract monitoring is carried out in collaboration with commissioning officers and Community Safety Officers and this approach will continue with any newly commissioned services as outlined in the report. This data encompasses information on protected characteristic groups. Monitoring information, including performance against key performance indicators is reported to relevant governance groups including the domestic abuse partner group and Safer Rotherham Partnership Board.

Continued monitoring of commissioned services and MHCLG funded projects services is taking place, with governance via the Safer Rotherham Partnership Domestic Abuse Priority Group and Safer Rotherham Partnership Board and the Domestic Abuse Governance group. This provides an ongoing mechanism to identify any potential gaps in service and to seek alternative funding/commissioning opportunities if unmet needs are identified.

The proposals seek to enhance the support offer and ensure they are accessible to all protected characteristic groups. Overall, the proposals will have a positive impact on equalities.

Summary of findings:

The Domestic Abuse Act 2021 introduced new requirements for local authorities in relation to domestic abuse services. As a result of the new requirements, the Government made funding available to Rotherham Council which has continued year on year.

In January 2025, the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government confirmed the 2025-26 domestic abuse duty funding of £802,591 which is an uplift from the previous year of £158,590.

This report explains the continued allocation of funding to projects commissioned in 2024-25. It also sets out proposals for the allocation of the uplift funding for new projects in 2025-26, which will aim to bolster the current domestic abuse service offer.

The recommended proposals consider the Council's statutory duty under the Domestic Abuse Act 2021 and the need to take longer term decisions to ensure best value for money and to provide the best chance of improving outcomes for victims of domestic abuse.
