- Whether phone boxes are in areas with a high level of population over 75 years of age, is in an area of below national average home ownership and has fewer than 50 properties within 400 metres.

Consultation and engagement

Two periods of public consultation have occurred through the Council website. The proposal for phone box closure has been advertised in the local paper and on a notice in the phone box. An email notification was sent out to relevant ward members, the emergency services, neighbourhood team and others.
