BT advise that phone boxes are supplied by 100%, REGO certified, renewable electricity. However, there are carbon emissions related to the transmission and distribution of that electricity. As a result, one phone box will emit, annually, 5kg of CO_{2.} The final decision regarding the proposal by BT is to remove the payphone and therefore this rate of emission will stop from the Canklow phone kiosk, but calls may be made instead on alternative private or public phones.

All telephone systems and infrastructure have a carbon footprint (including landlines, mobile phones and phone boxes). The average weekly call rate for the payphone prior to the arson attack was 2 it is unknown where these calls originated from. The decision on the payphone given the level of use it received prior to the arson attack, is considered (in terms of the Boroughs total carbon footprint) not to have a significant impact on climate change.

The effect of removing one public payphone is not considered to have a significant impact on climate change. The pay phone is owned and maintained by BT not the Council.
