Report Summary

At the Council meeting on 13 April 2022, it was noted that a petition had been received in respect of a request to the Council to improve road safety on Cumwell Lane/Kingsforth Lane. As the petition met the threshold for consideration by the Overview and Scrutiny Management Board, a meeting was held on 11 May 2022 to receive representations from the lead petitioners and also hear from the Cabinet Member for Transport and Environment and officers.

The Overview and Scrutiny Management Board made 7 recommendations which are presented at Section 3.1 of this report for consideration by Cabinet. The Constitution requires the Cabinet to respond to recommendations from Scrutiny within two months. This report is requesting Cabinet to consider the recommendations from the Overview and Scrutiny Management Board in respect of the petition along with the proposed measures identified by Council Officers and highlighted during the meeting by the Cabinet Member, Transport and Environment_outlined at Overview and Scrutiny Management Board recommendation 2.

Outcomes from the Overview and Management Board relating to Road Safety concerns Cumwell Lane / Kingsforth Lane Petition

1. Background

- 1.1 At the Council meeting held on 13 April 2022, a petition to request the Council to improve road safety on Cumwell Lane/Kingsforth Lane was formally received. The petition contained 622 valid signatures (revised) under the Council's Petition Scheme and was accordingly referred to the Overview and Scrutiny Management Board for review.
- 1.2 The Overview and Scrutiny Management Board meeting was held on 11 May 2022 to receive representations from the lead petitioners and also hear from the Cabinet Member for Transport and Environment and officers.

2. Key Issues

- 2.1 The petition requests the Council to improve road safety on Cumwell Lane/Kingsforth Lane.
- 2.2 The text of the petition is as follows:

"We the undersigned ask RMBC Highways to take significant action such as making the road much slower, installation of barriers and resurfacing the road to ensure the potential for further loss of life is minimised. For a long time individuals have been complaining regarding the state of the road conditions on Kingsforth Lane/Cumwell Lane Thurcroft at the exit to the landfill site. Lorries exit the site on a daily basis and deposit sludge and muck over the road leaving a sludgy coating on the asphalt. With many twists turns and dips this contributes to the hazard of driving the road. Yes some will say drive within your limits but the surface represents black ice and can catch out the most experienced driver. Unfortunately lives have been lost and irrespective of individual complaints being made very little sustainable action seems to have been taken. A road sweeper constantly going up and down the road only seems to spread the problem.

We understand that drivers not driving to the conditions of the road cannot be catered for but 99% of people using the road are experiencing hazardous driving conditions when driving within their limits for the road.

ACTION needs taking now by RMBC Highways to address the root cause and to ensure the chance of further accidents and lives lost is reduced.

Increased signage, substantial cleaning on site before lorries exit, street lighting, speed bumps or dare I say reduced speed limit and cameras. All relatively cheap measures compared to the loss of human life."

- 3. Overview and Scrutiny Management Board Recommendations and Proposed Measures to Improve Road Safety on Kingsforth Lane/Cumwell Lane
- 3.1 Detailed below are the recommendations from Overview and Scrutiny Management Board along with the proposed measures identified by Council Officers and highlighted during the meeting by the Cabinet Member, Transport and Environment which were also supported by the Overview and Scrutiny Management Board.
 - 1. That the call for action as outlined in the petition be supported.
 - 2. That the following proposed actions outlined by the Cabinet Member for Transport and Environment be supported:

| Install Vehicle Restraint System | Subject to outcome of assessment | Late 2022 |

- 3. That an evaluation is undertaken by the Strategic Director for Regeneration and Environment and the Speed Camera Partnership to assess the feasibility of installing average speed cameras on Cumwell Lane/Kingsforth Lane.
- 4. That this evaluation includes benchmarking of comparable local authorities with average speed cameras in their areas, any learning from the installation and their impact on road safety.

- That Cabinet and the Speed Camera Partnership be asked to support the resourcing of the infrastructure required for the installation and maintenance of average speed cameras on Cumwell Lane/Kingsforth Lane, should their feasibility be established.
- 6. That the Council's response to and lessons learnt from the fatal traffic incidents in 2018 and 2019 on Cumwell Lane/Kingsforth Lane be circulated to Board Members and the Lead Petitioner by the Strategic Director for Regeneration and Environment.
- 7. That an update on progress in respect of the recommendations outlined, is provided to this Board in 6 months with a further report to be provided to Improving Places Select Commission in 12 months.

4. Options considered and recommended proposal

- 4.1 The Overview and Scrutiny Management Board recommend that the call for action as outlined in the petition be supported.
- 4.2 Recommendation 1 is that Cabinet approve the response to the recommendations and anticipated implementation date set out in Section 3.
